SUBMISSIONS CRITERIA AND CATEGORIES

The RENO Magazine AIANN Design Awards recognizes built and unbuilt designs by members of the American Institute of Architects, and its Allied Members constructed and/or planned to be built in the Northern Nevada Region. Entries should exemplify the highest quality attributes of architectural, interior, and landscape design completed or planned unbuilt projects within the last five years.

Each entry will be judged on the basis of its design merits and its successful imagery in expressing the character of Northern Nevada. The jury will deliberate and judge on only the materials submitted by the applicant and as outlined in entry submission requirements. Project authorship will be concealed throughout the judging and jury process.

Entries will be judged on an individual basis and not in competition with each other. Equal emphasis will be given to every entry in each category. However, projects built or planned unbuilt with an emphasis on sustainability will receive more deliberation in the process. Design excellence and the quality of how the entry reflects the unique character of Northern Nevada and the Eastern Sierra region will be the final determination.

Call for Entry closes on Friday, November 3, 2006 at 5 p.m. Submittal binders are due on Friday, December 1, 2006 at 5 p.m. Late submittals may be received by December 2-15, 2006 by 5 p.m. with an additional late fee of \$50 per submission. Submittals will be juried on Friday, January 26, 2007.

Award recipients will be announced at the RENO Magazine AIANN Awards Gala and Presentation Ceremony held on Wednesday, May 2, 2007 with location to be announced. In addition to this special celebration honoring the award recipients, RENO Magazine is planning a 30-plus page section in the May/June issue featuring the winners and their projects. I ELIGIBILITY

The Awards program is open to all AIA Members, AIAS/ASID, and Design Professionals who are AIA Allied Members. Entries shall be built or planned unbuilt projects in the given categories constructed in the Northern Nevada and Eastern Sierra region since January 1, 2002. The Northern Nevada/Eastern Sierra region is defined as including Lake Tahoe-Truckee area, south to Tonopah, east and north to the Nevada state border.

Entries must be submitted by the lead member design professional or student for the work put forth for consideration.

There is no limit to the number of entries submitted by an individual firm, design professional, or student.

Each Submittal must include accurate names and contact information for all members of the design team, consulting team, contractor, subcontractors, major material suppliers, and individuals who substantially contributed to the project.

II WINNERS

Winner's projects within a 100 mile radius of Reno will be featured with photography in RENO Magazine, May/June 2007 issue and for web site use. RENO Magazine will absorb all expense of any additional photography they deem needed for publication after review of submittal binder.

Winners outside of the 100 mile radius must submit professional photography of the project at the winner's expense. Photography must include at least 5 photos, 4" x 6" size at a minimum of 300 DPI showcasing the projects top features. Photos must be submitted to RENO Magazine by March 2, 2007. If additional photography is needed, winner's projects must be accessible for photography by RENO Magazine from February 1 - 28, 2007. Photography shot by RENO Magazine becomes the property of RENO Magazine. Photography will be available for purchase after the May/June 2007 issue of RENO Magazine has been released to the public. III ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Complete the Call For Entry form included on this web site (duplicate as needed) and submit payment. Full payment, either check or credit card (Visa or MasterCard), must accompany entry form(s). All Call For Entry forms and payments must be received by Friday, November 3, 2006 before 5p.m. All submittal binders and materials must be received by Friday, December 1, 2006, by 5 p.m., at the Offices of the American Institute of Architects Northern Nevada, 5250 Neil Rd., Ste. 301 G, Reno, NV 89502. Late submittals may be received December 2-15, 2006 by 5p.m. with an additional late fee of \$50 per submission.

V ENTRY FORMAT

Entry requirements are as follows (a) submittal binder (b) project description form (c) project information packet (e) project exhibit board.

(a) Submittal Binder: 10 1/2" x 11 1/2" standard black, hard cover, 3-ring binder with project identification number (which will be supplied by AIANN) and no other identifying features.

(b) Project Description Form A: Provided on this web site, to be completely filled out with a brief description of the project, its goals and objectives with any sustainable aspects and inserted into the front page of the submittal binder.

(c) Project Information Packet: Provided on this web site Project Identification Sheet- Form B, Project Detail - Form C, Intern Compensation Disclaimer, 3 to 5 images of the project burned on a CD included in a sealed manila envelope at the back of the submittal binder.

(d) Project Exhibit Board: All boards will be displayed at the Gala and Presentation Ceremony. Each submittal must be mounted on 24" x 36" white or black 1/4" foam core board, vertically oriented. The board may be individually designed but must include at least 2 photographs or images of the project, the Project Description – form A and the phrase "2007 RENO Magazine AIANN Design Awards" in 48-point, Times New Roman, located in the top right hand corner of the board.

All materials become the property of the AIANN and RENO Magazine and will be part of the Truckee Meadows Community College Architecture Library Archives.

VI AWARDS AND CATEGORIES

The number and type of awards given will be determined by the Jury and may include Honor, Merit and Citation awards in each category. The Jury may determine not to award a winner in a category if entries submitted do not meet the judging criteria. In addition, the jury may award special recognition to sustainable projects. Where appropriate, categories could be new, renovated or unbuilt projects. The categories shall be as follows:

DEFINITION OF BUILT AND UNBUILT

Built: Meeting the requirements for a "Certificate of Substantial Completion".

Unbuilt: Commissioned projects that will be built and are complete through schematic design or beyond, but not yet built or completed. Theoretical projects are not eligible.

RESIDENTIAL (BUILT/UNBUILT)

Category includes: Single family, multi-family developments and planned urban developments
Under 5,000 sq. ft., 5,000 – 15,000 sq. ft., above 15,000 sq. ft.

COMMERCIAL (BUILT/UNBUILT)

Category includes: Offices, retail, financial, restaurants and hospitality projects
Under 10,000 sq. ft., 10,000 – 50,000 sq. ft., above 50,000 sq. ft.

PUBLIC (BUILT/UNBUILT)

Category includes: Schools, healthcare and governmental projects
Under 10,000 sq. ft., 10,000 – 50,000 sq. ft., above 50,000 sq. ft.

INTERIOR ENVIRONMENTS (BUILT/UNBUILT)

Category includes special areas under 5,000 sq. ft., 5,000 – 15,000 sq. ft., above 15,000 sq. ft.

LANDSCAPES

Category includes: Landscape designs that are completed or are currently under construction.

STUDENT

Student must delineate hypothetical/client requests or problems/issues to be solved, and include sustainability goals, quality of life requirements and spatial needs.
